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### 1. General information about ICHEC

#### 1.1. A mission

We train our students to become responsible, open-minded managers.

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#### **1.3.** A central location in the very heart of Europe

ICHEC is located at a stone's throw from the different administrations of the European Union. The cooperation possibilities with a very large number of international organizations as well as the access to public and private information are real assets for students and researchers.



The city is the center of a wide European market. Its broad and dense transportation network connects cities like Paris, London, Köln or Amsterdam. Hosting the European Commission and the NATO institutions, Brussels welcomes more than a thousand international public and private companies and is the 4th international congress center and the 7th world financial center.

But Brussels and Belgium are not only known for the administrations of the European Union. Indeed, Belgium preserved a rich architectural heritage still visible for example through the medieval city of Bruges or through Brussels, the city of Modern Style.


Moreover, Belgium kept a marked sense of tradition with its folk festivals, namely in Ghent, and its numerous cultural gatherings. And you will quickly discover that the local gastronomy does not draw the line at the French fries and beers. However, it is not pejorative to say that Belgium is a beer country as the special Belgian beers number among the best beers of the world.



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#### **1.4.** Two campuses

ICHEC has two campuses, both located downtown Brussels. It takes about 10-15 minutes to go from one campus to another by public transport (tram 39 or 44).



#### **Montgomery Campus**



The Montgomery Campus was the first Campus ICHEC bought in 1954. The first year and evening courses are taught on this campus. It is also there that you will find our library and a brand-new cafeteria.

#### Anjou Campus

The ESN ICHEC offers to ICHEC exchange students a support during their stay in Belgium, namely for administrative and academic procedures. It also organizes festive and cultural events (parties, pub crawl, sport tournaments, city trips, museums, etc.). A WhatsApp group will be created in the beginning of the semester.





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#### **1.3. AIESEC- ICHEC**



This international organization is run by students studying Economics and Commercial Sciences. Thanks to its international exchange programme, it aims at enhancing cross-cultural awareness cooperation. This organization offers different activities: job days, job fairs, case-study weekends, exchanges (practical experience abroad).

The CICHEC also offers a job service which helps students find occasional work very quickly.

It allows students to put into practice the theoretical teaching they receive, by conducting studies relevant to their areas of expertise, for very varied customers: entrepreneurs, SMEs, large groups, associations, communities etc.





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
#### 4. Accommodation

ICHEC has no on-campus student residence. Most Belgian and international students rent rooms to private landlords around the school, or in more animated areas.

These are usually furnished rooms in student houses accommodating 6-10 people, or in shared flats (3-4 students). Each student has his/her own bedroom, but kitchen and bathroom may be shared.

Tip: in Belgium the shared accommodations are called either "kot" or "colocation".

#### 1.1. Brussels and its 19 communes







Brussels is divided into 19 municipalities called "communes". The commune manages matters related to the daily life of the inhabitants of Brussels and the communal territory. In the Brussels-Capital Region the 19 communes play an essential role in urban governance.

For citizens the communes are the basic political body that is closest to their daily lives. It is where citizens are registered, where they make use of administrative services, where they vote, etc. And as non-Belgian students coming for a few months to Belgium, you will also have to register to the commune where you live at the beginning of your stay (see the section "formalities").

Each commune has a name in French and in *Dutch*, and has a postcode. Here is the list:



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#### **1.2.** Recommended areas and their characteristics

We would recommend you to try to find an accommodation in the following areas, either because the other communes are too far away from ICHEC (Jette, Anderlecht, Ganshoren, etc.) or because some areas are less safe than others (Saint-Gilles, Saint-Josse, some parts of the city center of Brussels, parts of Schaerbeek, etc.).



#### a. Residential areas

These communes are a little bit more expensive, and you could expect to find an accommodation for  $500 \in$  to  $600 \in$  per month. But they are generally well-maintained rooms in apartments or houses in quiet and safe neighborhoods.

Some nice neighborhoods are Schuman, Montgomery, Mérode, Tomberg, Stockel, Georges-Henri, Cinquantenaire, etc.



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#### b. Animated areas

These parts of Brussels are a little bit cheaper and you could expect to find an accommodation for 400€ to 500€ per month. There are more student rooms and shared apartments or shared houses than in the residential areas.

Some nice neighborhoods are: Place du Luxembourg, Cimetière d'Ixelles, Flagey, Meiser, etc.

#### 1.3. Where to look for an accommodation

Each year a **Facebook group** is created 3 months before the start of the semester (by incoming exchange coordinator, Mrs Kristien Minet). Several announcements will appear here. Ichec students going abroad and looking for a student keeping his/her room will post his/her announcement in the group. This group will be available for you around mid-November.

Be careful with individual announcements on facebook groups. To avoid scams, don't hesitate to ask the opinion at Mrs. Kristien Minet.

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#### **1.4.** Some possible difficulties

First, you have to know that it is harder to find a room during the fall semester than during the spring semester. Indeed, the reason is that, at this period, many Belgian students and international students are also looking for a room in Brussels. Whereas during the spring semester, many international students stay only for one semester and they leave their room in January.

#### But don't start looking too early. We suggest you start looking from June on and not before.

Secondly, some owners do not want to rent only for one semester, as they prefer renting their apartment for the whole year. Beware that some owners also rent their apartment for 12 months, and not only for the academic year. So, if you are coming for the first semester, we would recommend you look for a room <u>before</u> arriving in Brussels! If you do not find anything before your arrival, make sure to arrive a few days before the start of the classes and to take appointments to visit various apartments on these days.

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#### 6. Languages of instruction

Most of the courses during the semester are taught in French. However, we offer each semester a wide range of business and management courses in English.

No proof of language (TOEFL, IELTS, etc...) is required but we highly recommend a B2 (Common European Framework of reference) level in English/French depending on the language of the classes the student will follow.

An intensive week of French language classes is available the week before the start of each semester (see important dates).

Weekly French lessons at beginner (min 30h required), intermediate and advanced level are available during the whole academic year.

#### 7. Visa requirements

To enter Belgium, students from outside the European Union (except for Iceland, Liechtenstein, Monaco, Norway and Switzerland) do need a visa. Once ICHEC has received the application documents, the student will receive an acceptance letter to obtain a student visa (Schengen D).

Please note that all the non-European students will need an acceptance letter to get their visa. ICHEC international office can send the acceptance letter directly to the consulate/Embassy if you give incoming exchange coordinator (Kristien Minet) the email address of your contact person at the Embassy/Consulate.

Be aware, the visa process might take more than one month.

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#### 8. Courses offered to exchange students

The **ICHEC learning agreement** should be sent to Mrs. Kristien Minet at the latest on June 15 (for the 1<sup>st</sup> semester) and on December 15 (for the 2<sup>nd</sup> semester). However, you will have the possibility to change your study programme during the first week of the semester.

All ICHEC courses are open to exchange students. You can choose any course mentioned in the ICHEC programmes: from BAC1 to MASTER2, in French, English, during the day or in the evening. The complete course list is available via <u>https://www.ichec.be/en/inward-exchanges</u>

For your stay as an exchange student you should report your selection of courses per semester in a Learning Agreement. Within the program Erasmus+ the Learning Agreement is a mandatory document.

For all non-EUR students  $\rightarrow$  ICHEC learning agreement template can be used.

In the framework of the Erasmus+ program the European Commission developed a platform that allows students and universities to handle Learning Agreements online. So far this platform is designed for the exchanges between Erasmus universities only. Please ask link to your home coordinator.
